






IILM LUCKNOW LAUNCHES BVOC. (BFSI)


ROUNDTABLE MEET OF EDUCATION PROMOTION SOCIETY OF INDIA



NEPOTISM

Nepotism is favouritism shown by somebody in power to relatives and friends, especially in appointing them to high positions. The chief complaint in a company that operates through nepotism is the patent lack of fairness. Ease of Doing Business

Ease of Doing Business measures the level of business regulation effectively for small and medium size domestic firms located in the largest business cities of 190 economies. The role of Government policies in the daily operation of small and Medium size domestic firms are a central focus of the Doing Business Data which encourages the efficient, transparent and high implementation of regulation in 11 areas of regulation affection SMEs in the largest business cities of an economy.

In short, **Doing Business Data only focusses on the role of government policies in the daily** operations of SMEs and how business regulations are implemented by Government and experienced by private firms on the ground.

Doing Business gives some important dimensions to domestic firms and provides quantitative indicators and the data focusses on trade volume, FDI (foreign direct Investment), Market capitalization in stock exchange, private credit as percentage of GDP.

What is Ease of Doing Business Score?

Economies are ranked on their ease of doing business, from 1–190. A high ease of doing business ranking means the regulatory environment is more conducive to the starting and operation of a local firm. The rankings are determined by sorting the aggregate scores on 10 topics, each consisting of several indicators, giving equal weight to each topic. The rankings for all economies are benchmarked to May 2018.

In a big boost for NDA government, India climbed another 23 points in the World Bank's ease of doing business index to 77th place, becoming the top ranked country in South Asia for the first time and third among the BRICS.

In the last two years the country has climbed 53 notches, a performance matched in the past only by Bhutan. The biggest gain was in construction permit where India climbed 129 ranks to 52nd place on the back of targeted government effort to remove hurdles.
